

## **SHADES OF GRAY**

Revamping a traditional space was on the to-do list for interior designer Ann Wisniewski, of AJW Designs Inc., when she was asked to create an elegantly casual powder room in a posh 1990s French-style Buckhead estate. Her goal? To create drama amid a neutral background, which she accomplished by incorporating unexpected pops of oranges, reds and beautiful peacock blues drawn from other areas of the home (with two Donghia pillows); replacing the previous red, green and yellow wallpaper with eye-tricking cheetahs disguised in the patterns of an assuming silver and white wall covering by Thibaut; and adding contemporary artwork by local artists J. Scott and Holly Irwin, along with an angora-hair bench by Moss Studios. "I wanted to update it to a more transitional look, but to keep elements of the traditional look as well," explains Wisniewski, who also updated the cabinetry, added a new sink and granite countertop, used brushed nickel fixtures, faux painted the original mirror to resemble aged pewter and infused traditional-style lighting from Circa. "That's part of how I like to design," she says. "When you have different styles in a space it adds interest, and if you do it in the right proportion, it works.
